### Principal's Message

High Desert Juvenile Court School (HDJCS), operated by the San Bernardino County Superintendent of Schools (SBCSS), is designed for students who are under the direct supervision of the Juvenile Court. High Desert Juvenile Court School is WASC accredited through 2014.

This report will include the following Juvenile Court School Programs:

- High Desert Juvenile Court School (High Desert Juvenile Detention and Assessment Center (HDJDAC) detention units)

Auxiliary programs that serve our school population:

- ROP Commercial and Residential Painting
- JCS Site and Satellite Library
- Special Education
- Workability

High Desert Juvenile Detention and Assessment Center (HDJDAC) Detention Units:

There are presently 7 living units operating within the HDJDAC complex. Each living unit is provided with a school program, which includes one teacher, a full time paraeducator in the maximum-security classrooms, and a part time paraeducator in the minimum-security classrooms. The average stay for students in this program is 21 days. The basic instructional day of 240 minutes is maintained for all students and most receive 300 minutes of instruction daily.

The integrated curriculum includes the following academic areas:

- Reading and Language Development
- Science
- Mathematics
- Character Education
- Social Studies
- Consumer Education
- Health and Physical Education
- GED Preparation
- Visual and Performing Arts
- ROP Commercial and Residential Painting

The Alternative Education Curriculum Team is a standing committee of the Alternative Education Department. They routinely review and revise curriculum course outlines, evaluate materials for adoption and recommend textbook purchases. ROP classes meet ROP course standards and are approved by the San Bernardino County ROP consortium. Instruction is provided based upon San Bernardino County Superintendent of Schools' Alternative Education course outlines. These outlines are aligned to State Standards and are routinely reviewed and modified by the Alternative Education Curriculum Team and approved by the County Board of Education. Teachers have at their disposal various technological tools to enhance the instructional program, which include computers, Smart Boards, Computer Podiums, three rolling computer carts each equipped with twenty laptop computers, and multi-media materials.

Immediately upon entry into the school program each student is assessed in math and reading using Star Reading and Math (a different instrument than the State Assessment and Reporting (STAR) system). These instruments have been adopted by the California State Board of Education for use in the Alternative Schools Assessment Model (ASAM) reporting system. NWEA MAP is a new reading and math assessment tool that is currently under implementation throughout SBCSS.

At this time an oral school history is taken from the student including school progress, home language, special needs and discipline. School records including transcripts, special education records and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act plans are requested from the appropriate school districts. If there is no response to our requests within two days, school staff begin follow-up procedures. Test results and school records are used to establish an appropriate education program for each student. The school participates in the JDAC's integrated behavior support system. School discipline procedures follow the requirements of the California Education Code for suspension/expulsion including all safeguards and student due process rights.

In 2008 the school received a full six year accreditation. This is the highest accreditation standard issued by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges.

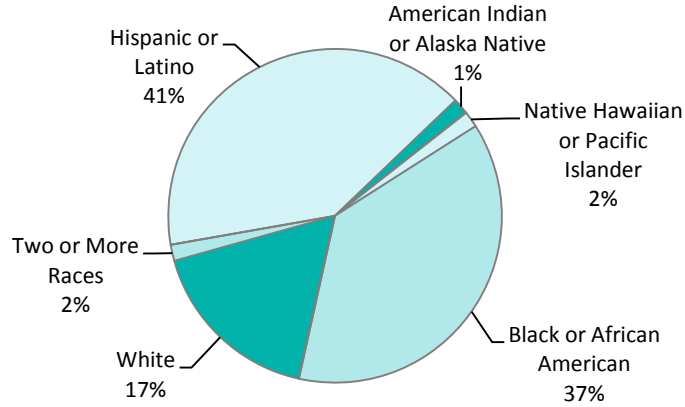

### Professional Development

During the 2010-11 school year, all staff had opportunities to participate in site-based staff development during after-school workshops, individual mentoring opportunities, and outside conferences in addition to all day Saturday training. Professional development focused on instructional strategies, enhancing the curriculum, safe practices, and classroom management. Teachers who needed to meet highly qualified status in specific content areas also participated in staff development focused on meeting those requirements: VPSS coursework, Autism Certification, and EL Certification.

For the 2008-09 school year, we dedicated two days for professional development. In 2009-10, there were no days, and in 2010-11, there were two days dedicated for professional development.

### School Safety

All detention instructional staff at High Desert Juvenile Court School and Probation Department cooperatively uses the Handi-Talki communication system to ensure a safe and dependable method of communication in the event of an unforeseen emergency, as well as daily movement of students to and from classroom settings.

The School Safety Plan was last reviewed, updated, and discussed with the school faculty in January 2011.

### School Facilities

Classrooms are maintained in a manner that assures that they are clean, safe and functional. The sites are free of gas leaks, and nonfunctional heating, ventilation, fire sprinklers or air conditioning systems. There are no known hazardous materials posing a threat to staff or students, and no structural damage creating a hazardous or uninhabitable condition. The Juvenile Detention and Assessment Center is comprised of three sites: Central Valley and High Desert facilities. Custodial services are offered through the probation department at each site.

The July 2009 Budget Act suspended funding for new Deferred Maintenance extreme hardship projects until July 1, 2013. It also suspends the district matching share requirement for Deferred Maintenance from fiscal years 2008-09 through 2012-13.

### Public Internet Access

Internet access is available at public libraries and other locations that are publicly accessible (i.e., the California State Library). Access to the Internet at libraries and public locations is generally provided on a first-come, first-served basis. Other use restrictions include the hours of operation, the length of time that a workstation may be used (depending on availability), the types of software programs available at a workstation, and the ability to print documents.

### Standardized Testing and Reporting Program

The Standardized Testing and Reporting (STAR) Program aims to identify strengths and weaknesses to improve student learning. STAR consists of four key tests that are designed for the student's age and individual needs. These tests include: the California Standards Test (CST), California Modified Assessment (CMA), and California Alternate Performance Assessment (CAPA).

The CSTs are multiple choice tests in English-language arts, mathematics, science, and history-social science for varying grade levels. Some grade levels also participate in an essay writing test. The CSTs are used to determine students' achievement of the California Academic Content Standards. These standards describe the knowledge and skills that students are expected to learn at each grade level and subject.

The CMA is a modified assessment for students with disabilities who have an individualized education program (IEP). It is designed to assess those students whose disabilities prevent them from achieving grade-level proficiency on an assessment of the content standards with or without accommodations.

The CAPA is an alternate assessment for students with significant cognitive disabilities who are unable to take the CST with accommodations or modifications or the CMA with accommodations.

## API Testing

Assessment data is reported only for *numerically significant* groups. To be considered numerically significant for the API, the group must have either: (1) at least 50 students with valid STAR Program scores who make up at least 15% of the total valid STAR Program scores, or (2) at least 100 students with valid STAR Program scores.

## API Ranks

Schools are ranked in ten categories of equal size, called deciles, from 1 (lowest) to 10 (highest) based on their API Base reports. A school's "statewide API rank" compares its API to the APIs of all other schools statewide of the same type (elementary, middle, or high school). A "similar schools API rank" reflects how a school compares to 100 statistically matched similar schools. This table shows the school's three-year data for statewide API rank and similar schools API rank, for which information is available.

## Academic Performance Index

The Academic Performance Index (API) is an annual measure of the academic performance and progress of the schools within California. API is measured on a scale from 200 to 1,000. This score reflects the school, district or a student group's performance level, based on the results of statewide testing. The state has set an API score of 800 as the statewide target.

The annual API reporting cycle consists of the Base and Growth API. The Base API data is released one year after testing occurs (i.e. The 2010 Base is calculated from results of statewide testing in spring 2010, but is not released until May 2011). Growth API, released following the Base API, calculates test results taken from the most recent school year (i.e. The Growth API is calculated from results of statewide testing in spring 2010 and released in August 2010). Therefore, for the 2010-2011 API reporting cycle, the 2010 Base indicator and 2011 Growth indicator are used.

### Admission Requirements for California's Public Universities

## Career Technical Education Programs

### Career/Employment Preparation & Placement

Strong emphasis is placed on job preparation through a School/Probation Career Assessment Program. As part of a cooperative program the school and the probation department work together:

- Every student that enters the court school program is assessed for career/vocational interest by utilizing the "COINS" software program.
- Developing public sector work sites, placing students at sites and monitoring their progress weekly.
- Developing job placement activities for evaluating the progress of those who are hired.
- Placing appropriate students into community ROP classes and monitoring progress of students.
- Employed students are mandated by the court to contribute a portion of their earnings toward restitution fees. To date, many thousands of dollars have been paid by working students toward completing their restitution responsibilities.

### ROP Residential and Commercial Painting

Daily classes are offered to detention student at the WVJDAC and the CVJDAC. Students receive employment preparation and practical experience in the field of both residential and commercial painting.

### Employment Preparation Program

All students are assessed to obtain their academic levels and career interests. These results are used to set their education and career goals for the program. Students participate in career guidance, character education and job seeking skills workshops. Regional Occupational Programs, affiliation agreements with private industry, are utilized by students to gain specific job skills based on their established goals.

The California High School Exit Exam (CAHSEE) is primarily used as a graduation requirement in California. Students are first tested in tenth grade and have multiple chances to retake the test if the student does not pass the first time. The grade 10 results of this exam are also used to determine AYP for high schools as required by the federal NCLB law. The CAHSEE has two sections: English-language arts and Math. For the purposes of calculating AYP, three performance levels were set: Advanced, Proficient, and Not Proficient.

### Types of Services Funded

Title I, Part A and other categorical funding is utilized according to the school plan and under the direction of the HDJCS School Site Council. Textbook funds are spent by the Alternative Education Curriculum Team on state approved texts and materials. These are distributed to all teachers. Teacher training funds are used to help all teachers become NCLB qualified. Title III is used for EL certification preparation and testing, additional EL materials, etc. HDJCS Students also have supplemental tutoring services available to them for CAHSEE prep, specific academic needs or English Language Learner support through Title I, Part A. Additionally, foster youth students are taught their educational rights funded by Foster Youth grant.

All special education students have access to services provided under Work-Ability programming. These will range from real world employment opportunities, through career education programs, to basic occupational assessment. Depth of service is dependent upon length of stay in the program.

### Juvenile Court School Library:

Currently, Juvenile Court Schools and the San Bernardino County Probation Department cooperatively maintain and utilize an on-site library (located at Central Valley Juvenile Detention and Assessment Center, CVJDAC) from which students may self-select appropriate reading materials, which may be brought back to the living unit as well as to be used in classroom activities. All students have access to the library material either through classroom visits or a mobile distribution cart. Materials are also available to assist teachers in supplementing classroom instruction. The library also operates a satellite system that makes books available to students whose security restriction does not allow library visits and to classrooms at HDJDAC.
